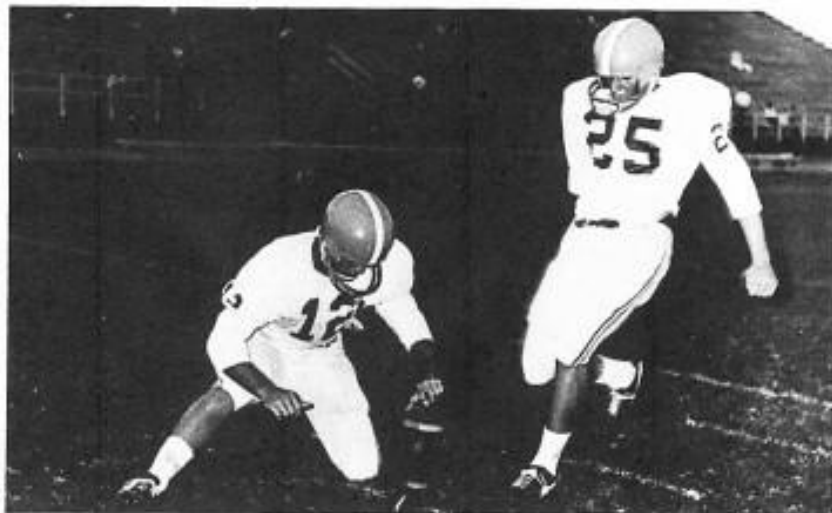




## Let's Have A Ball

## It's Beginning To Look A Lot Like Christmas

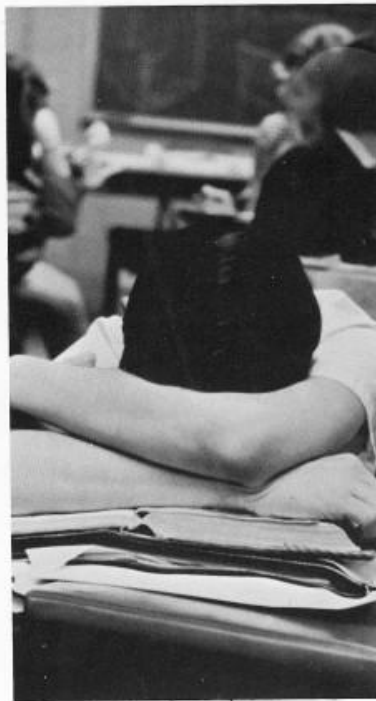

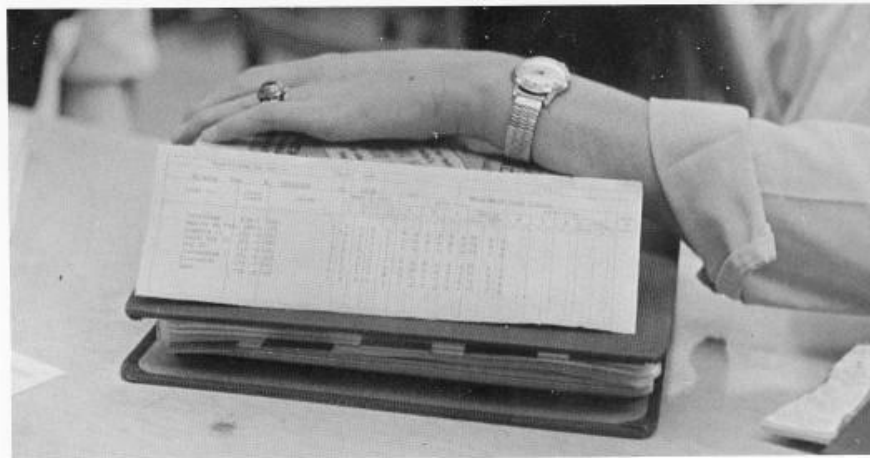

## Campus On The Move



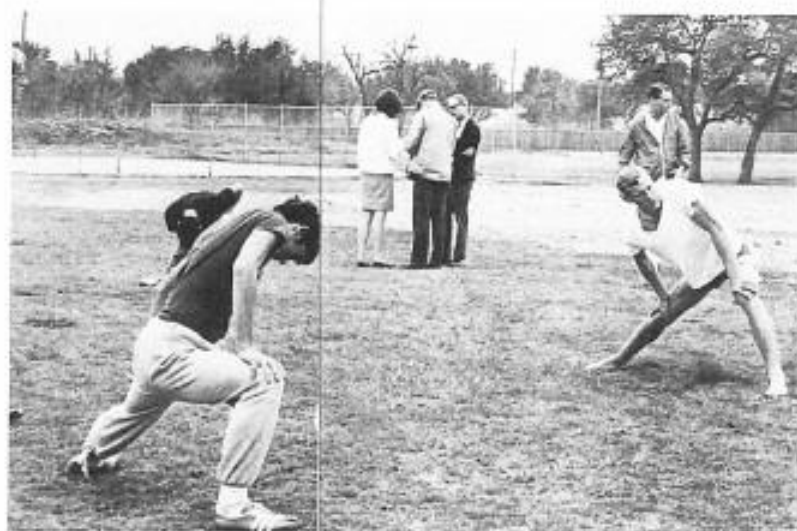

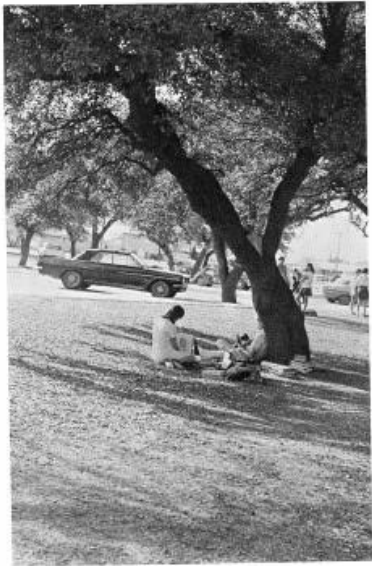
## Out Of Hibernation

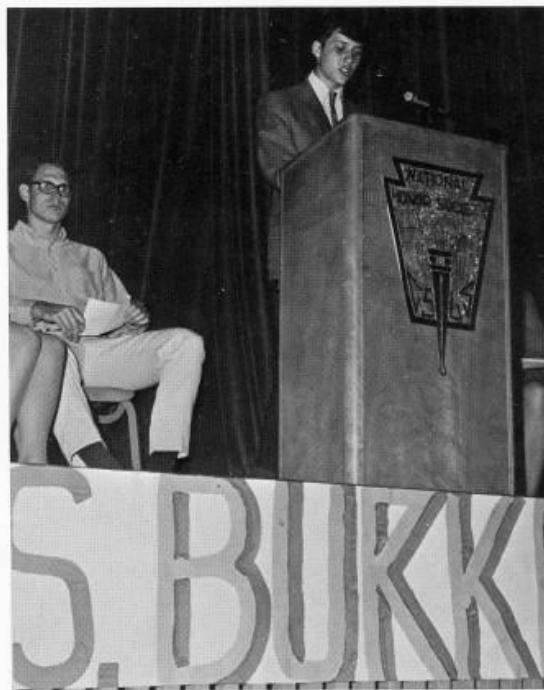

## The End Is Near

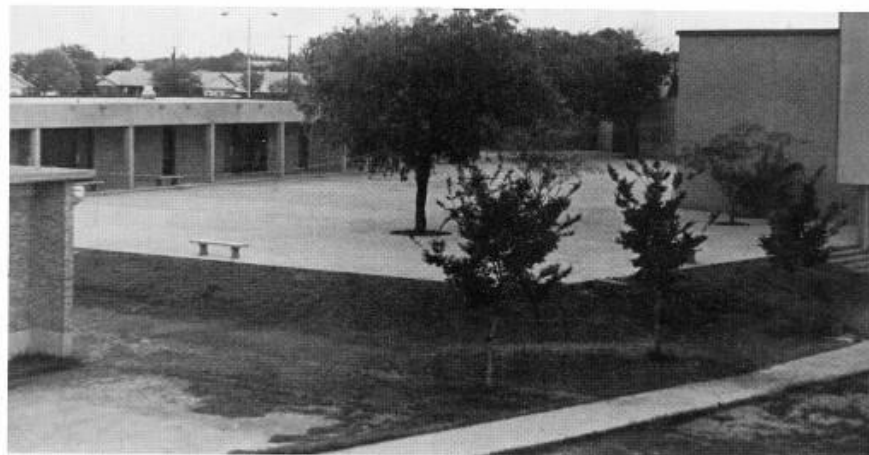
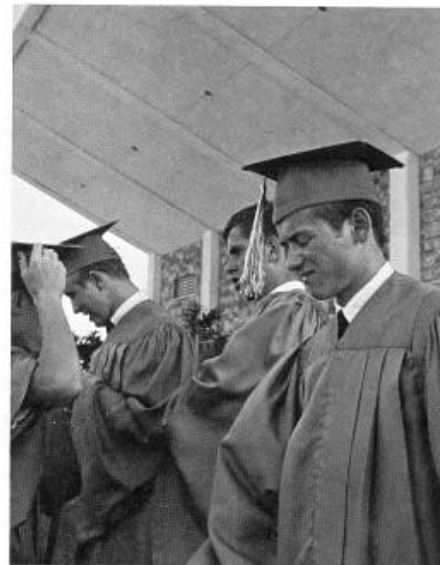

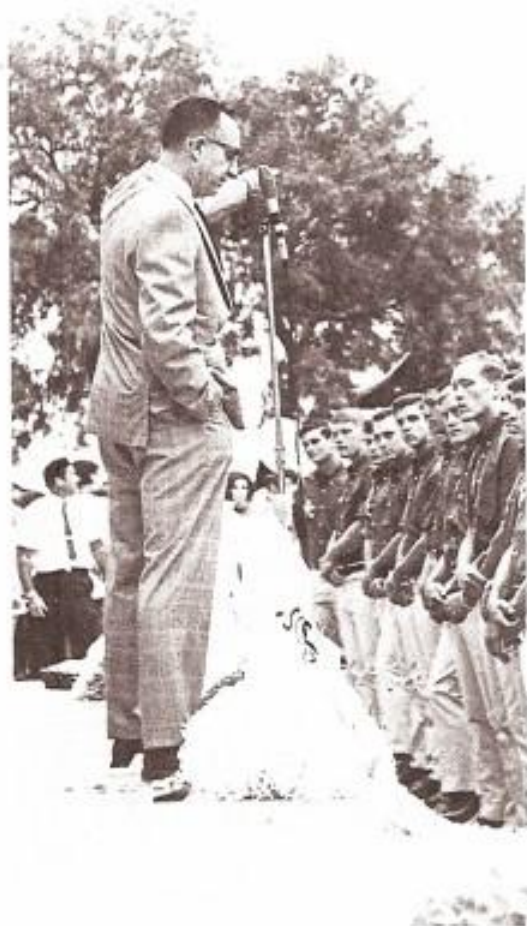

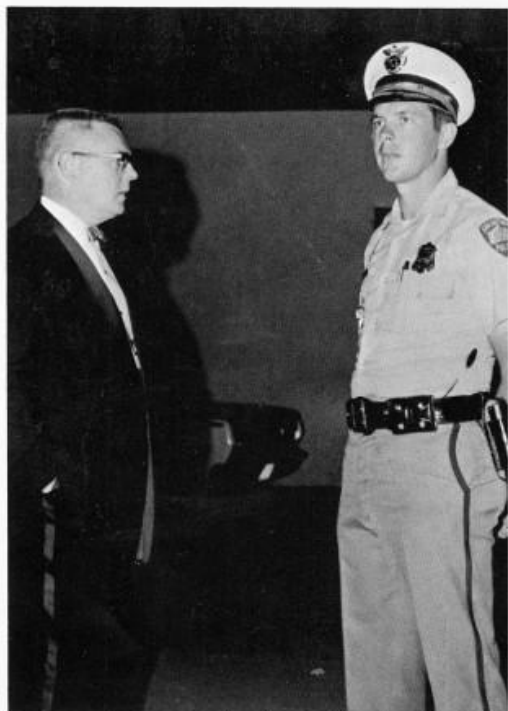
## A Principal And A Person

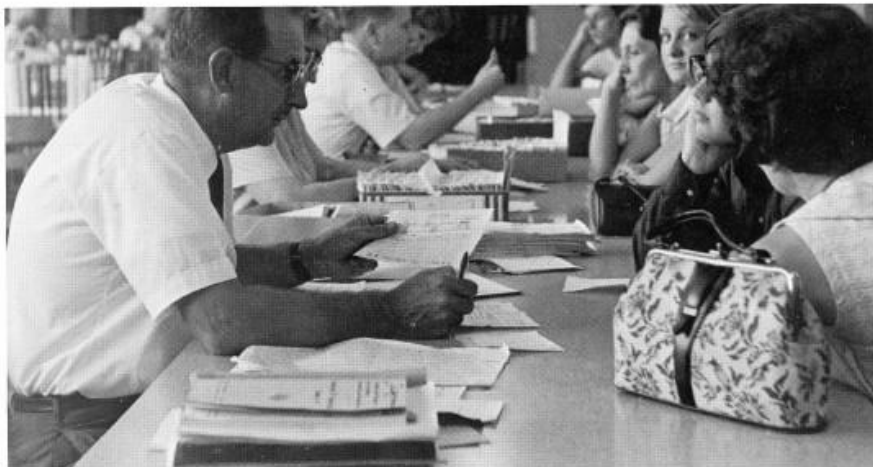

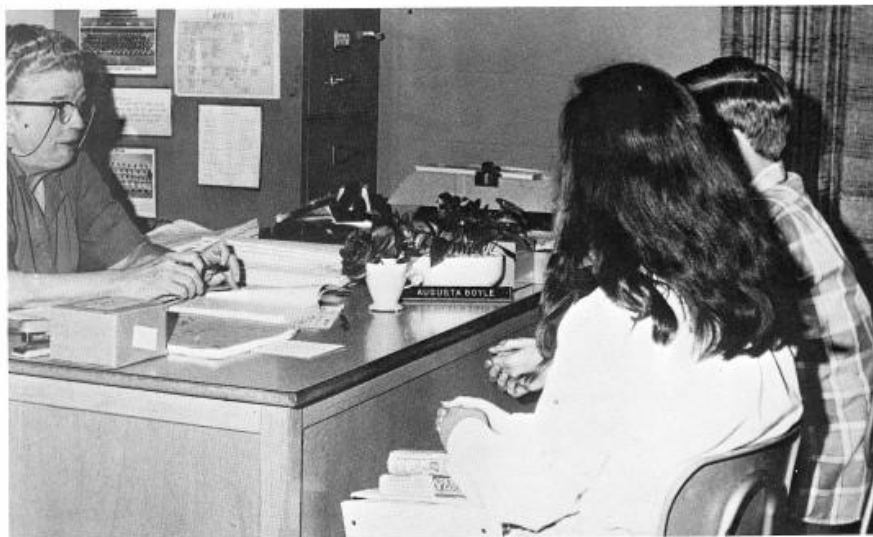

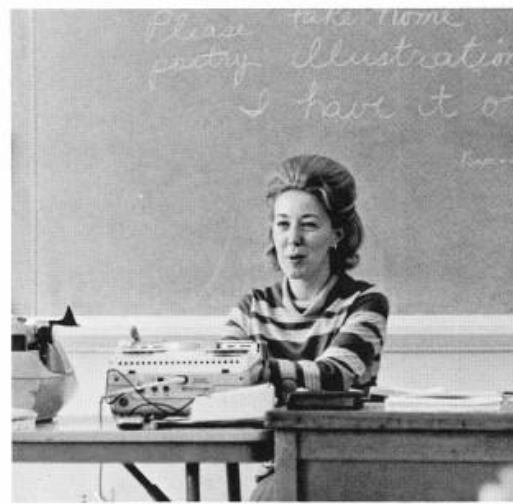

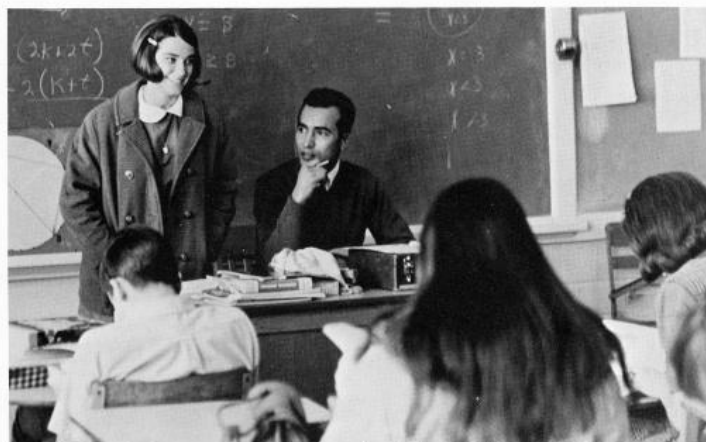

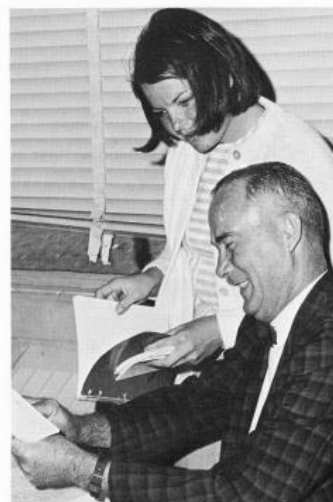

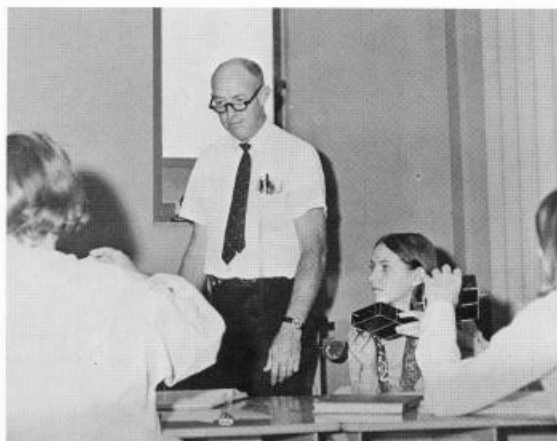

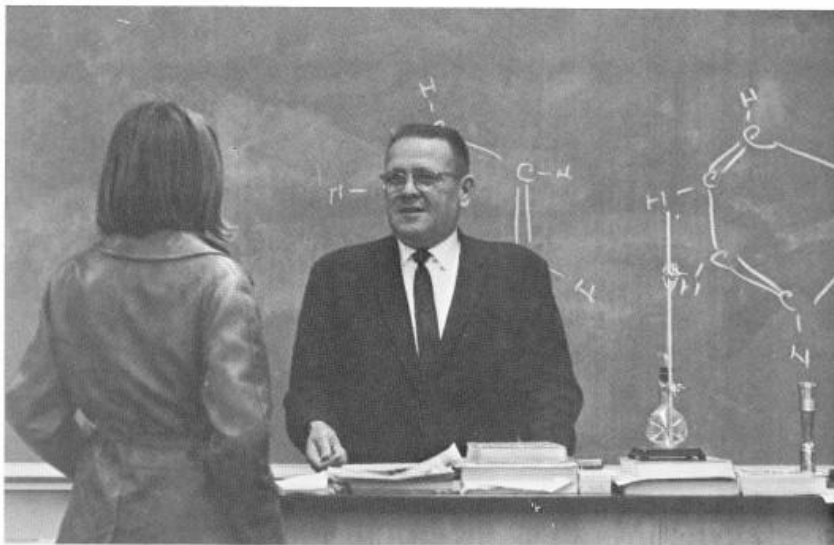

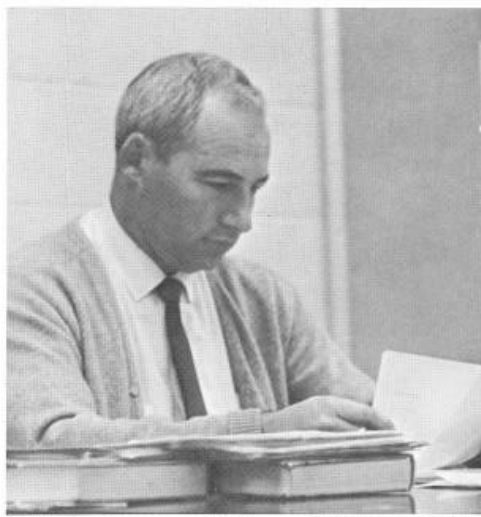

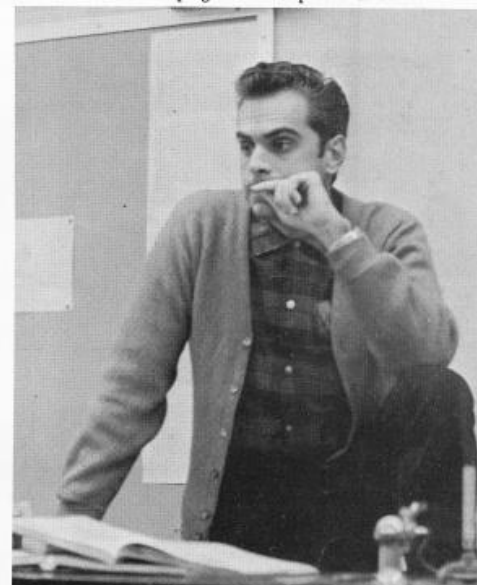

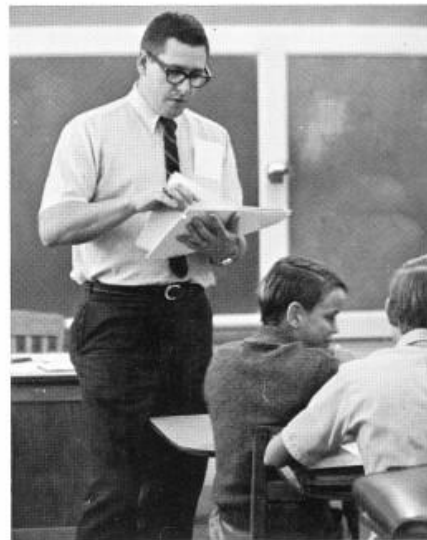

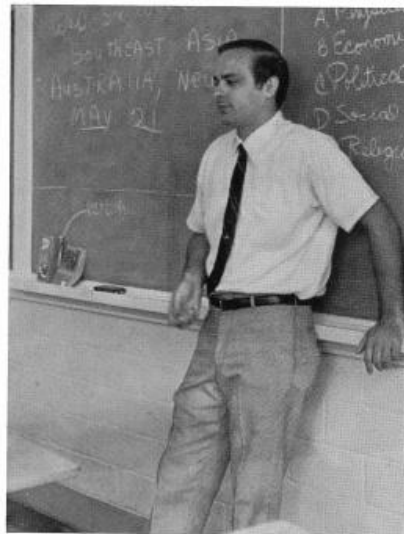

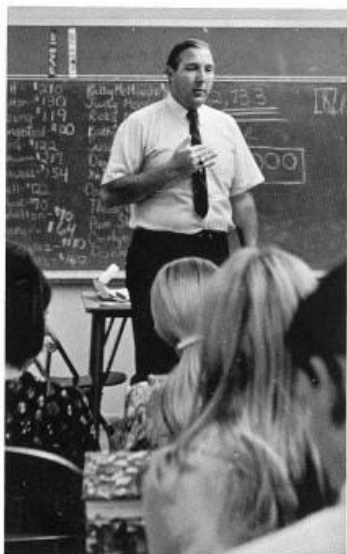

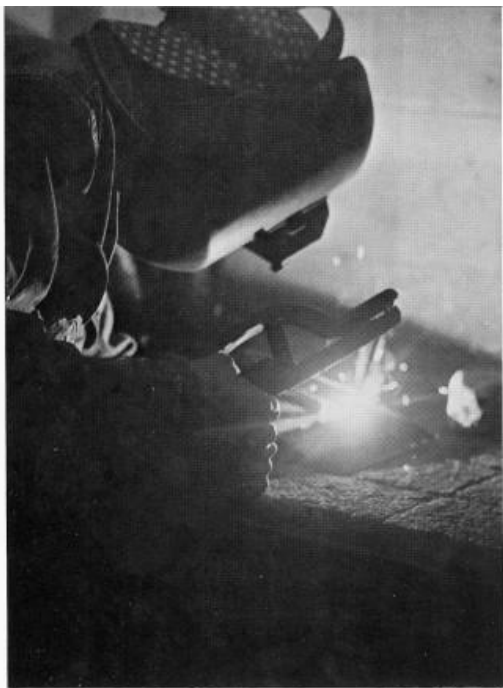

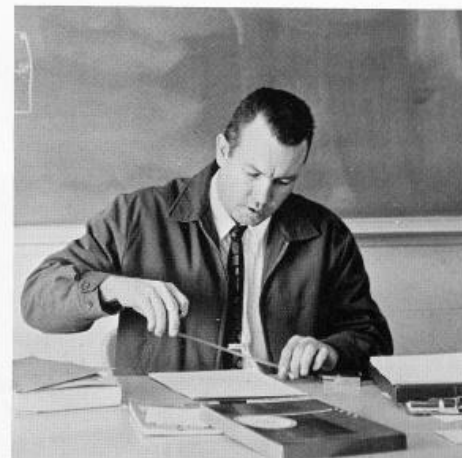

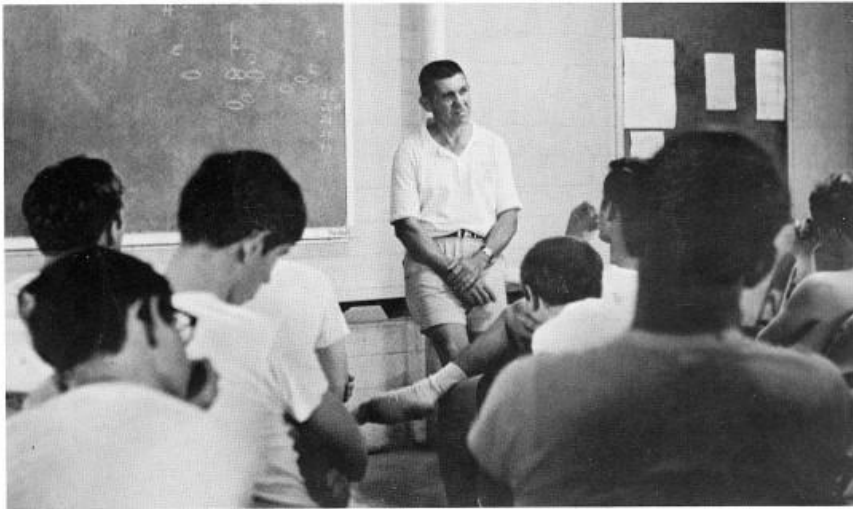

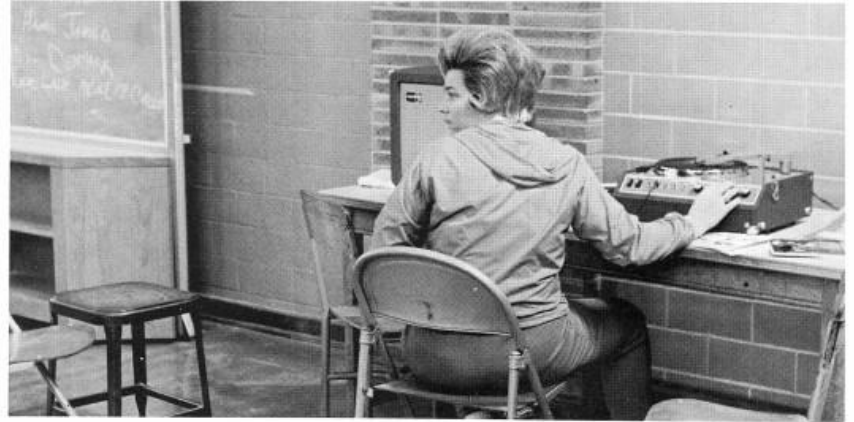

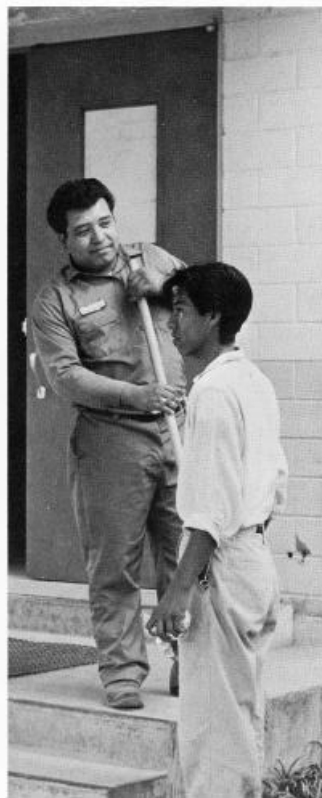

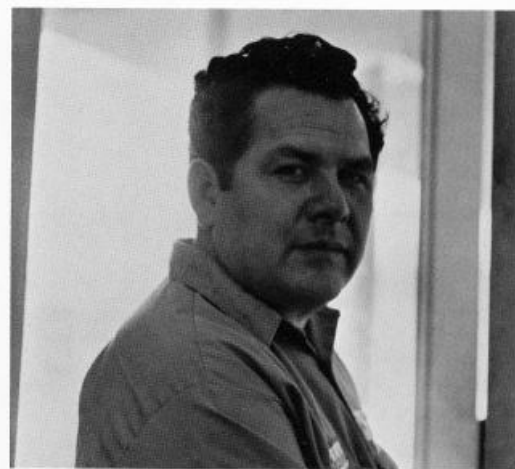

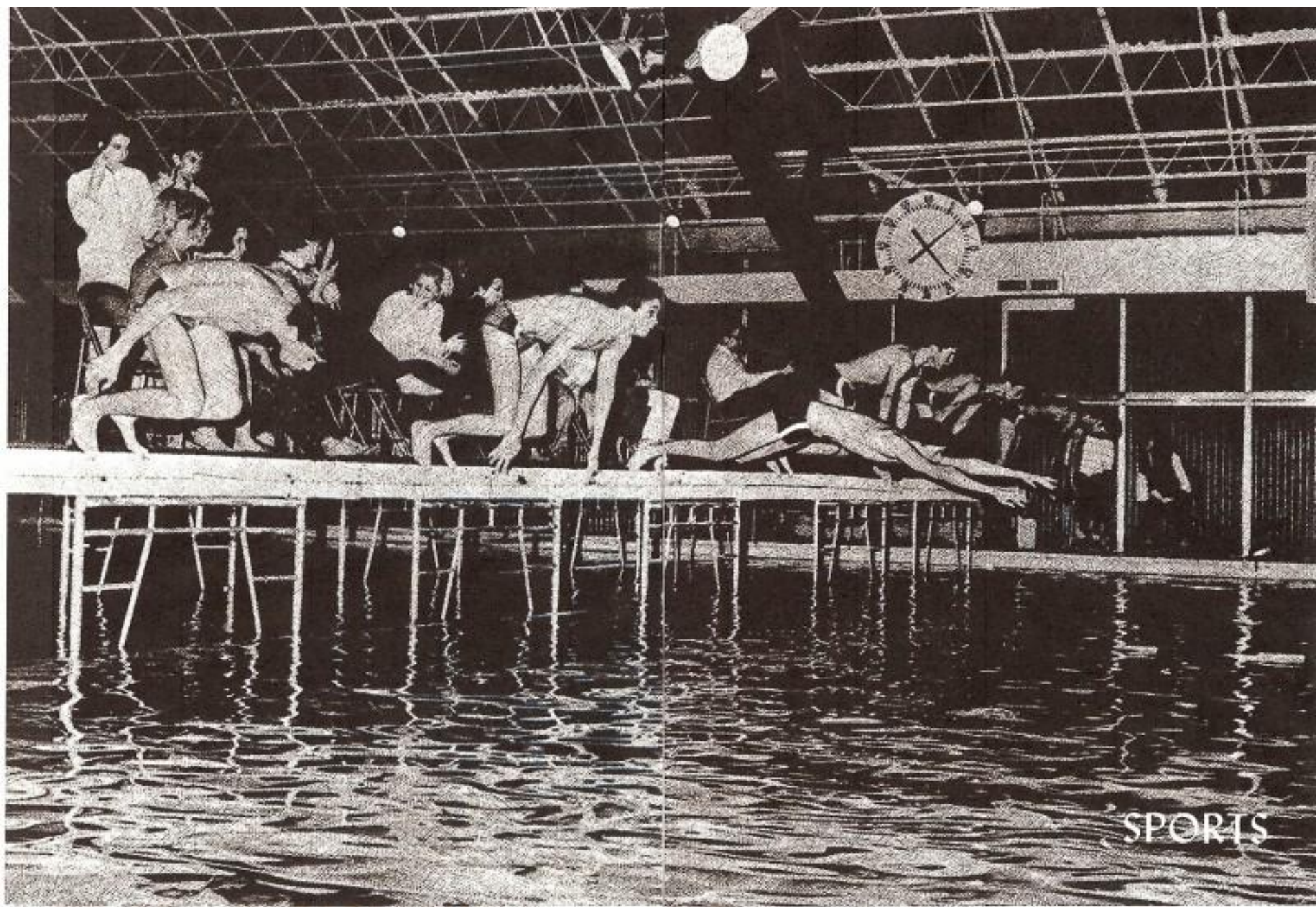

People were beginning to talk about a great Brahmas team... But injuries and lack of depth with little experience began to tell... People stopped talking about a championship... But the Brahmas didn't lay down for anyone... The courage of injured to play... and the leadership of a good coaching staff brought MacArthur a satisfying season.

## Defense Steals The Show At Austin

Breaks, often decide a football game . . . And you make your own breaks . . . A stubborn MacArthur defense and a 55-yard touchdown run with an intercepted pass by Gary McCaffery provided the keys for the Brahmas 7-0 upset of the Austin Maroons . . . A rugged Brahma defense led by McCaffery, David Wylie, Tim Alexander, Jim Briscoe, Gary Sheets, Lloyd Wakefield, Ken Corder, caused five fumbles and intercepted two passes which stymied Austin's offense time after time . . . McCaffery's game winning interception came in the second quarter . . . Don Haines conversion made it 7-0 . . . And the defense took over.



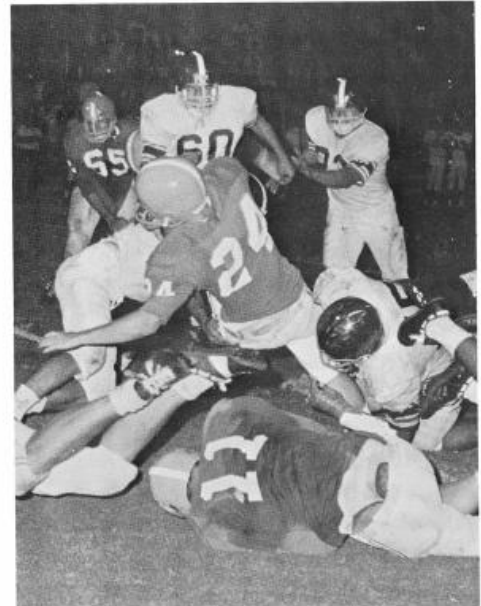

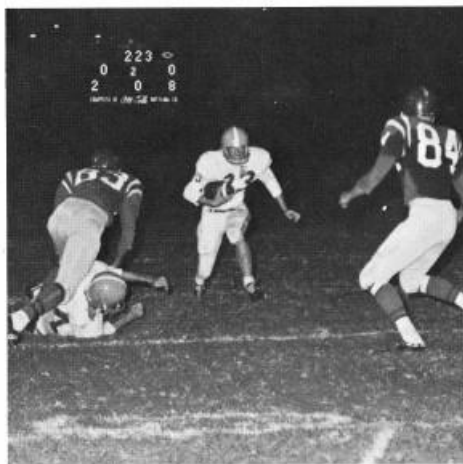

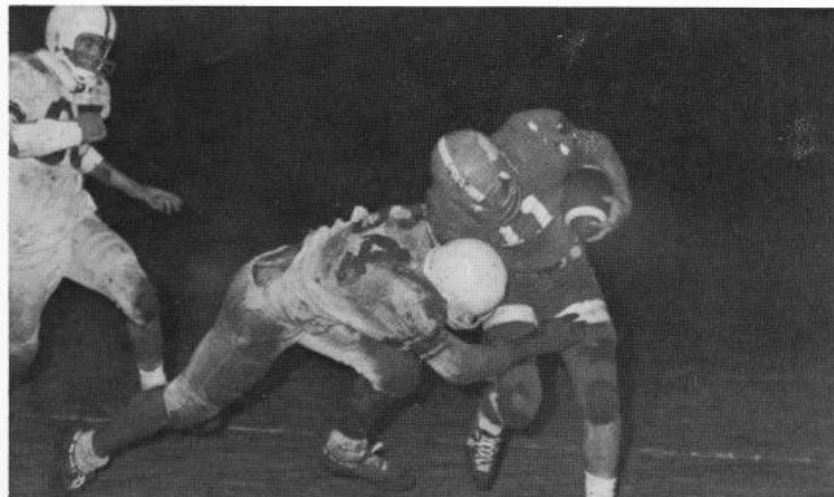

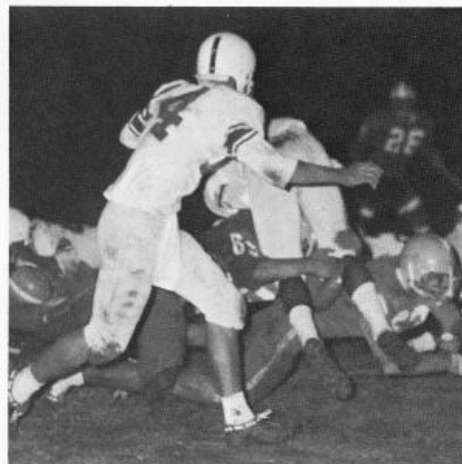

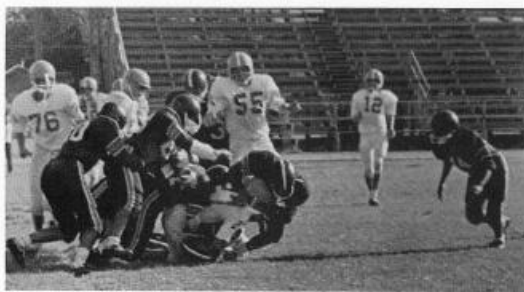

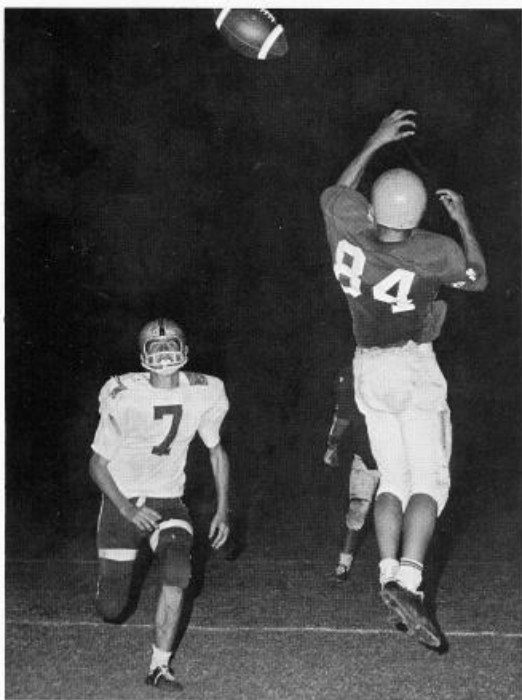

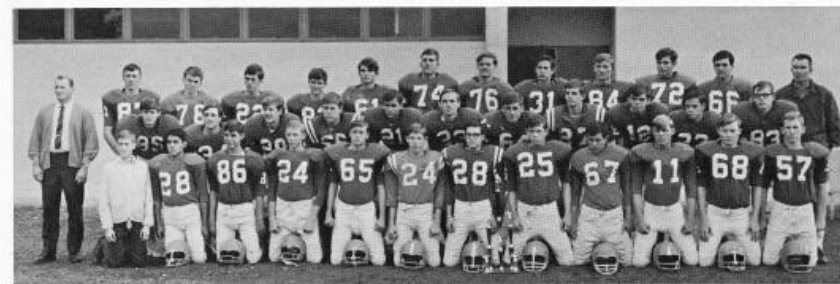

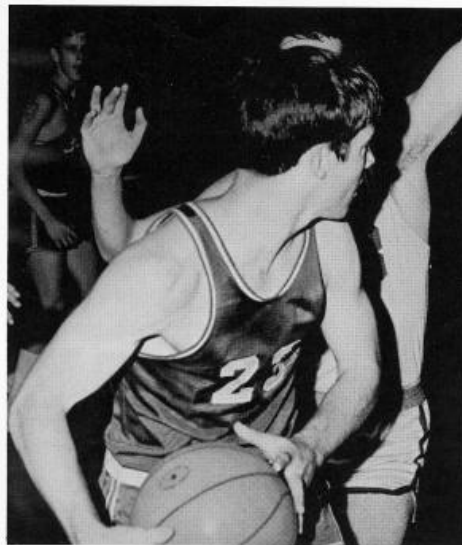

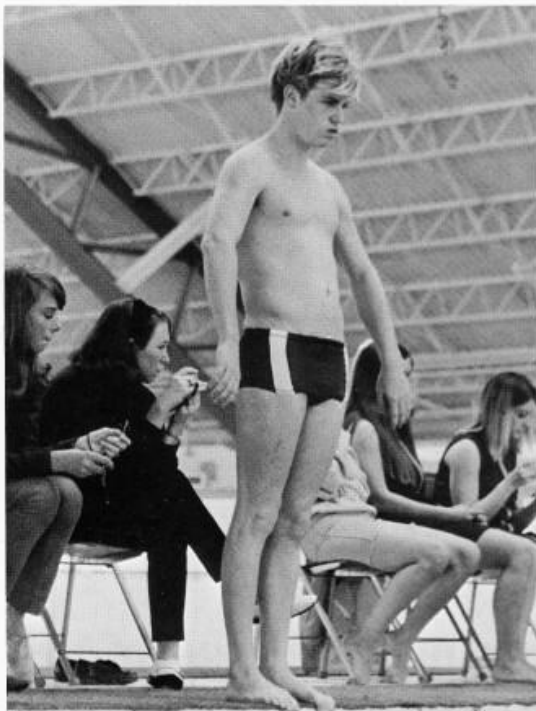

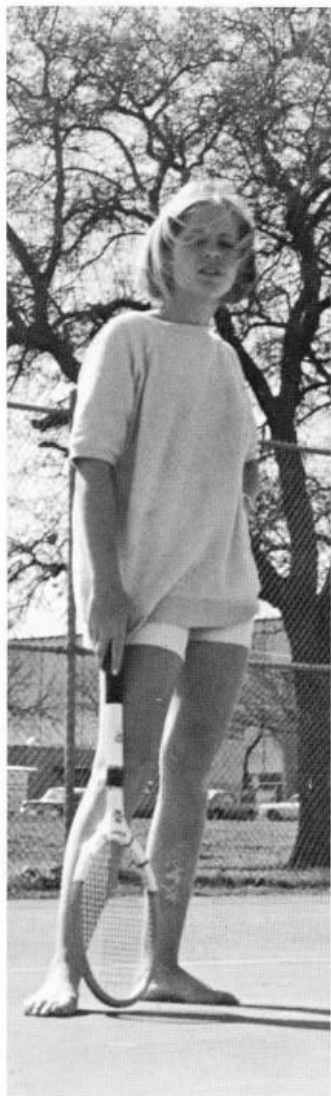

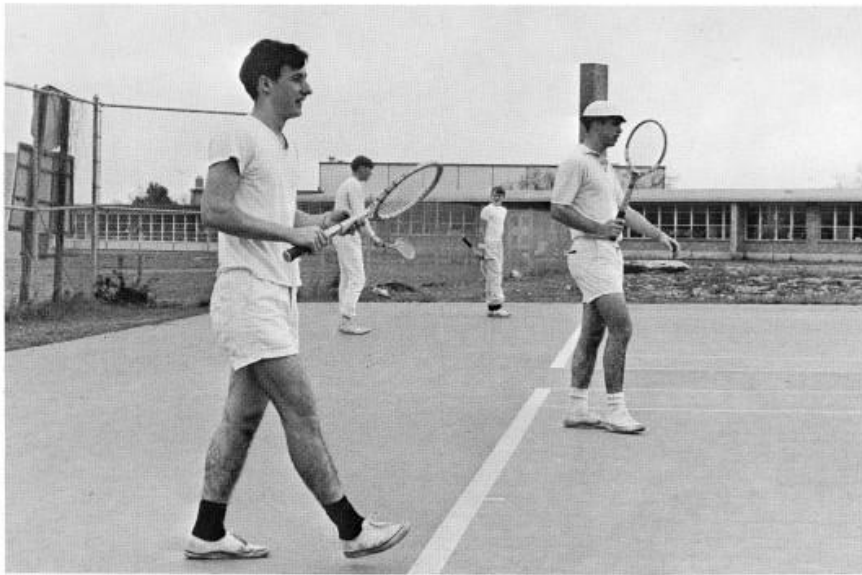

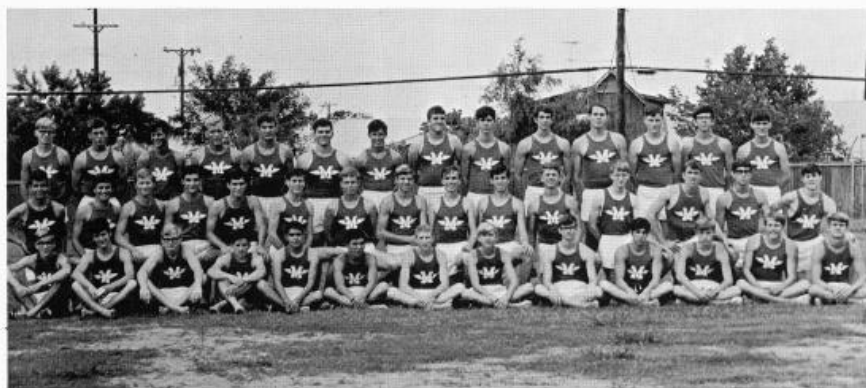

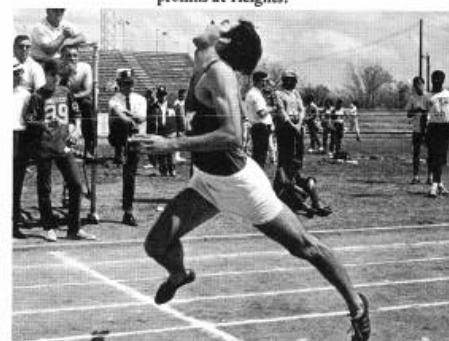

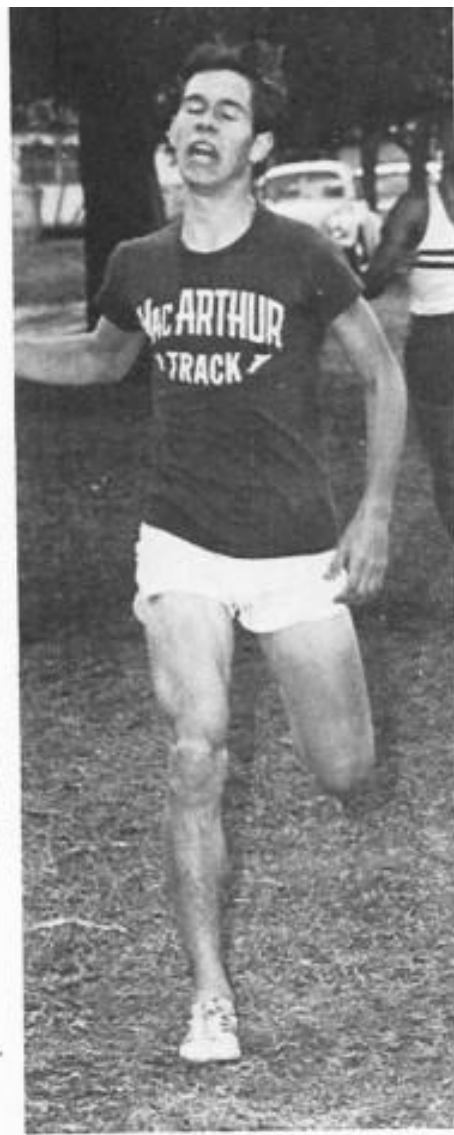

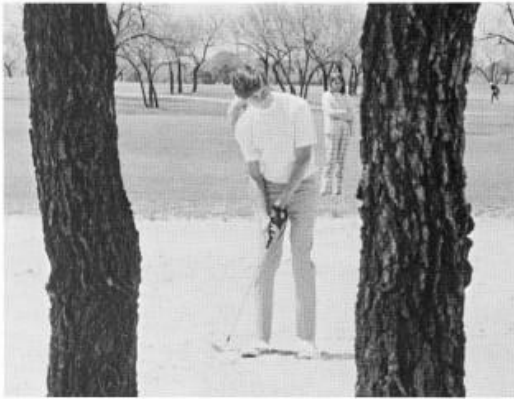

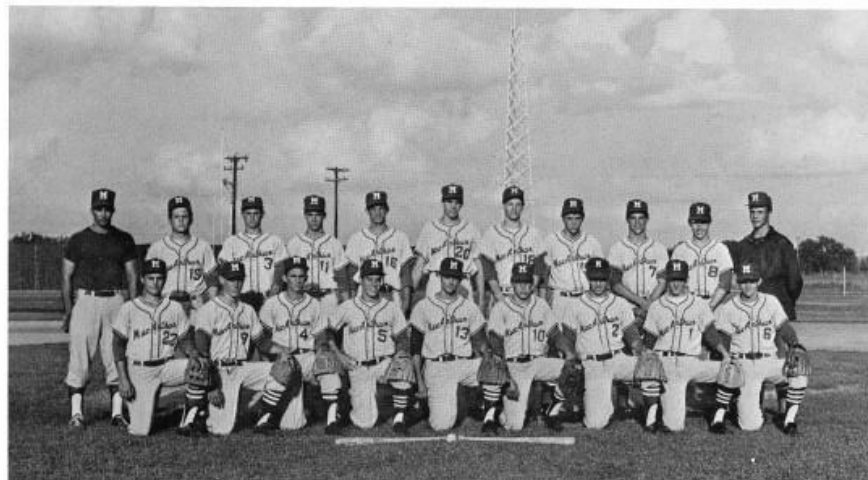
# BASEBALL

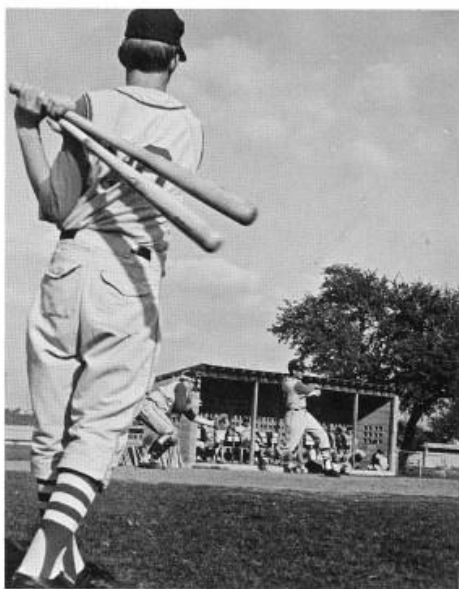

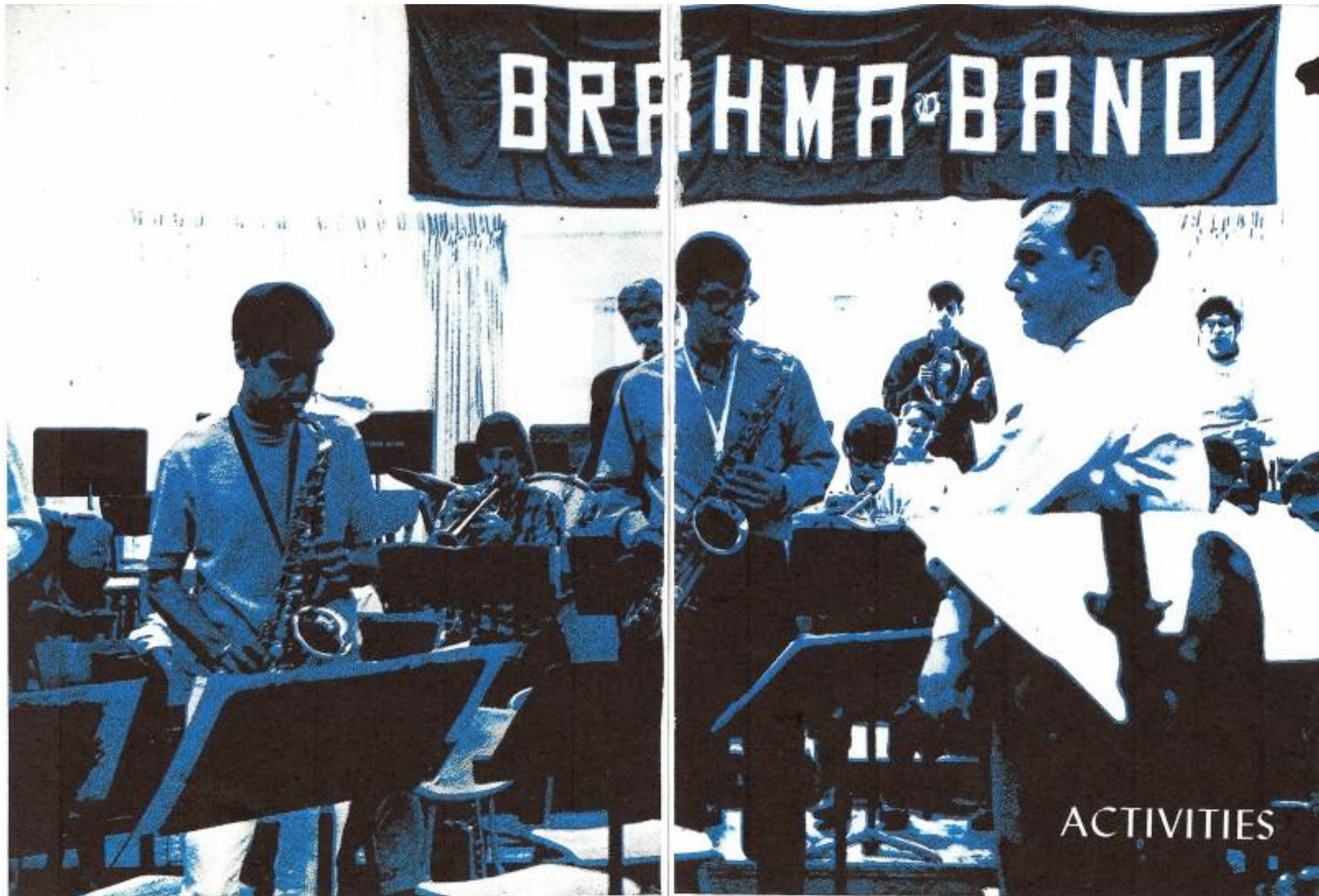

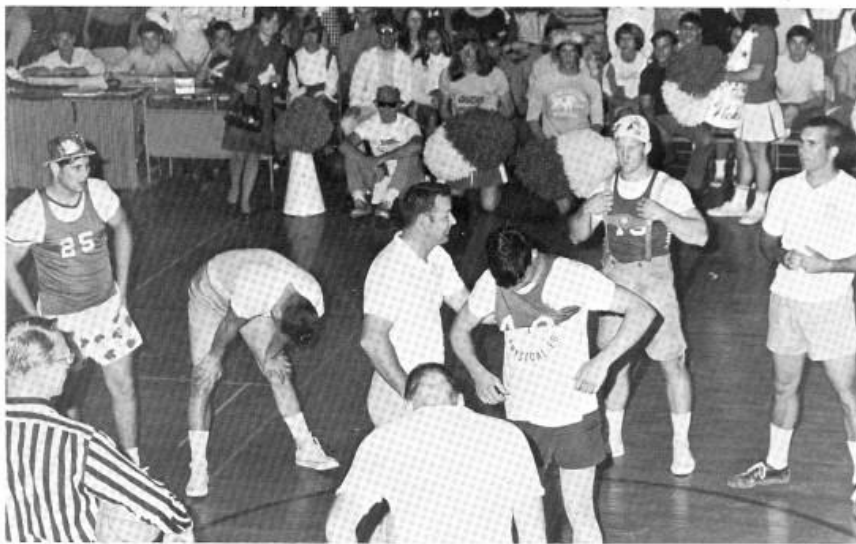

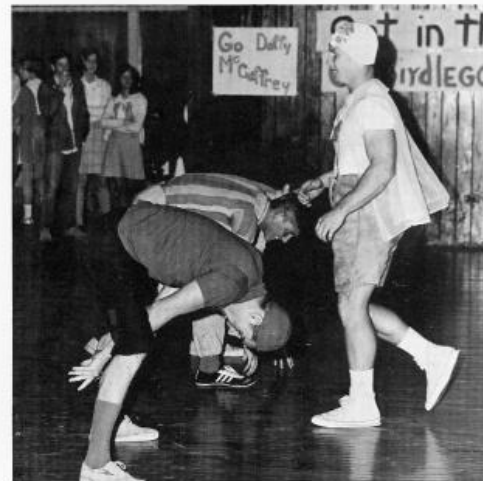

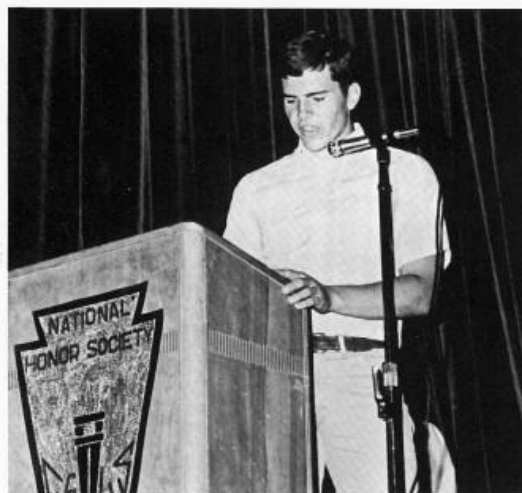

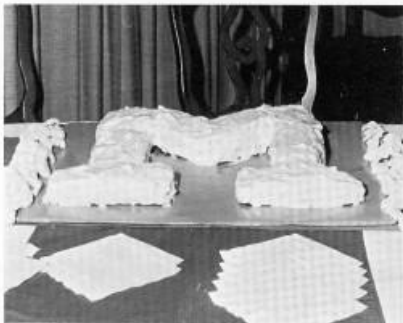

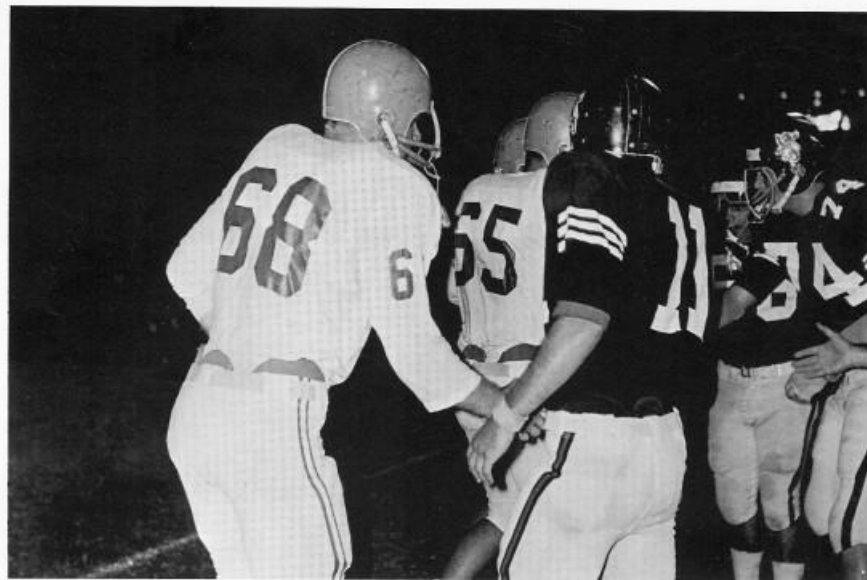

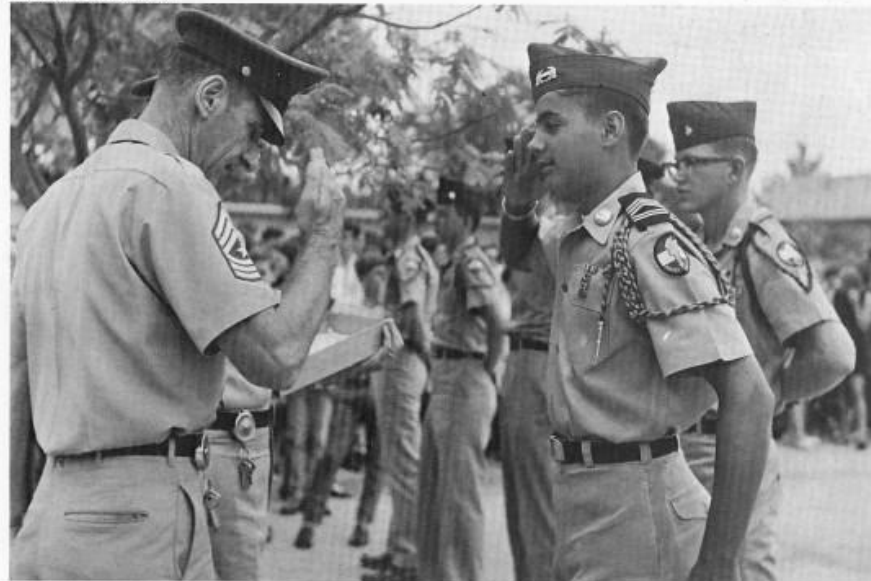

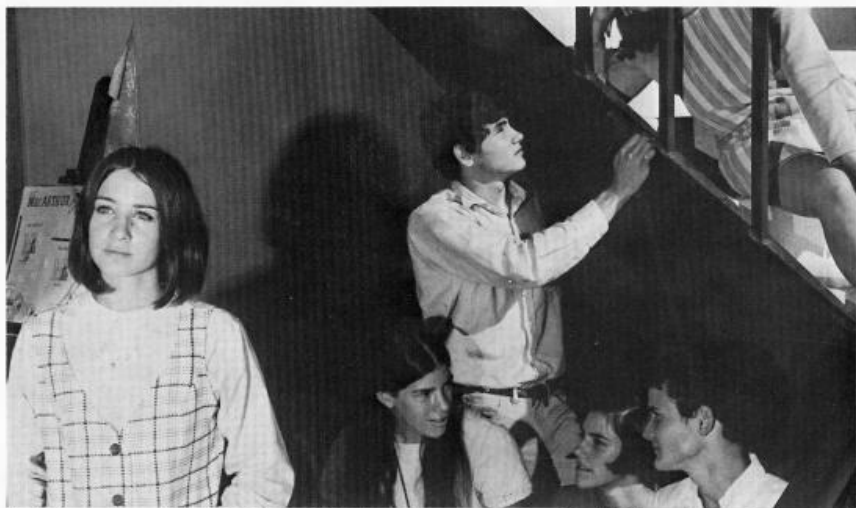

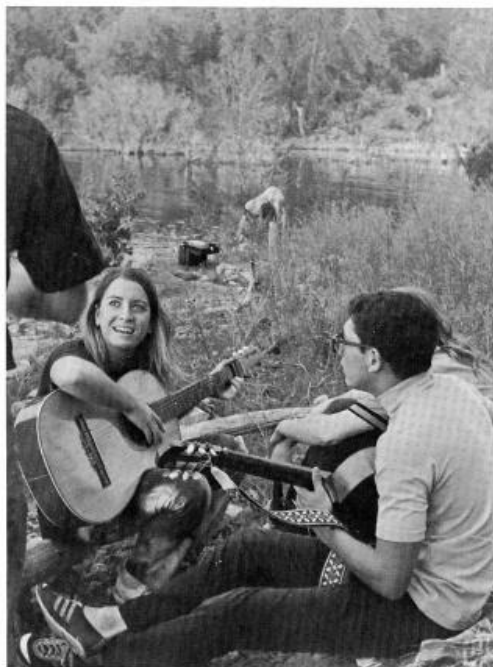

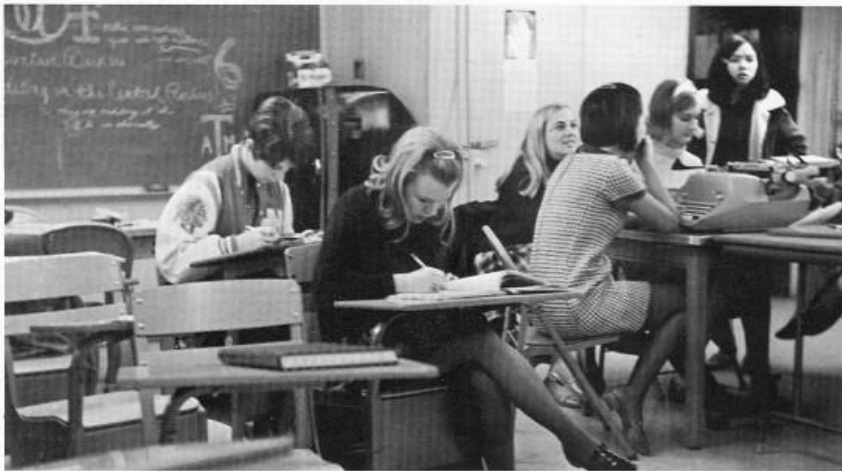

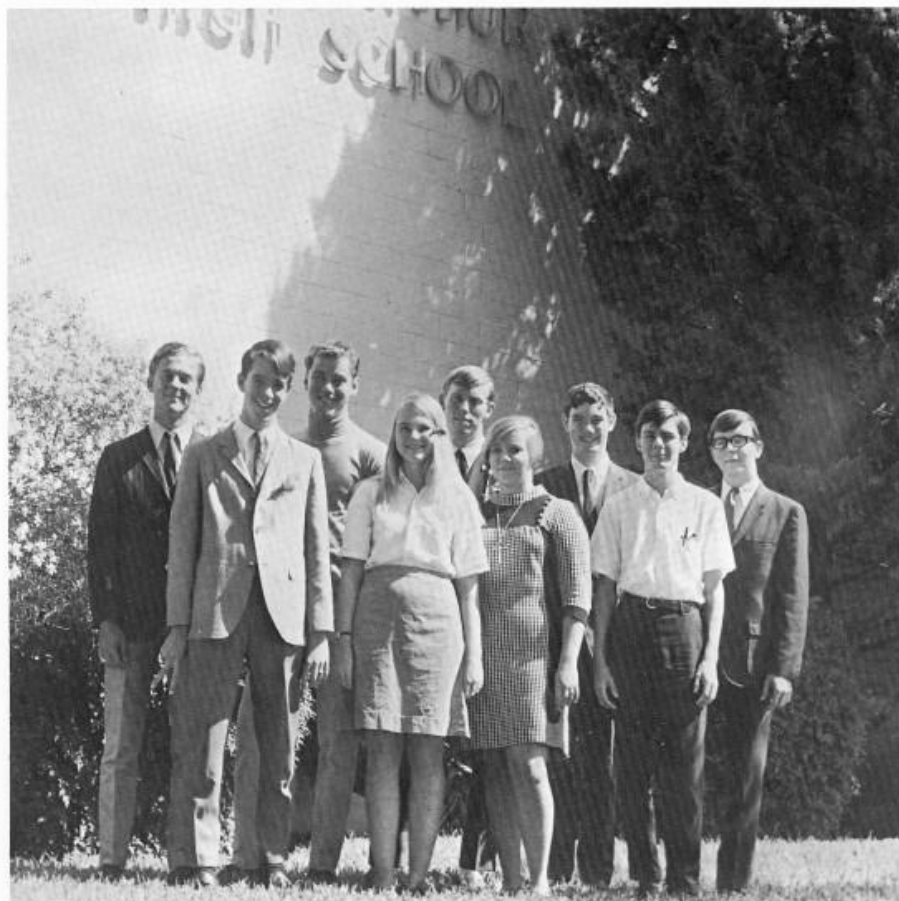

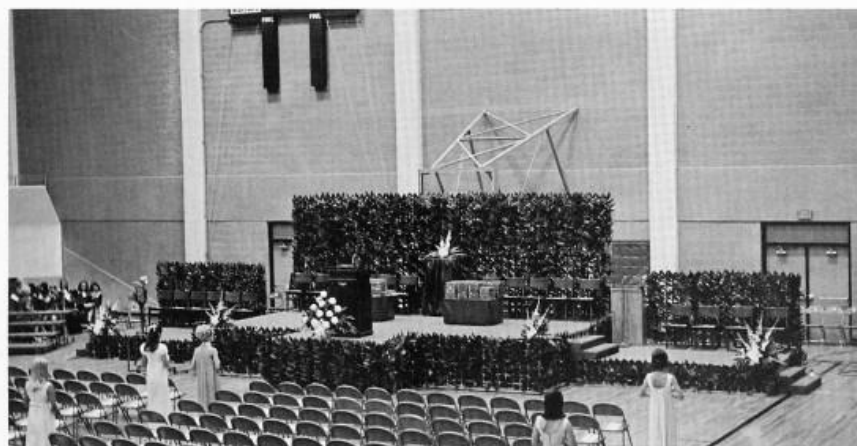

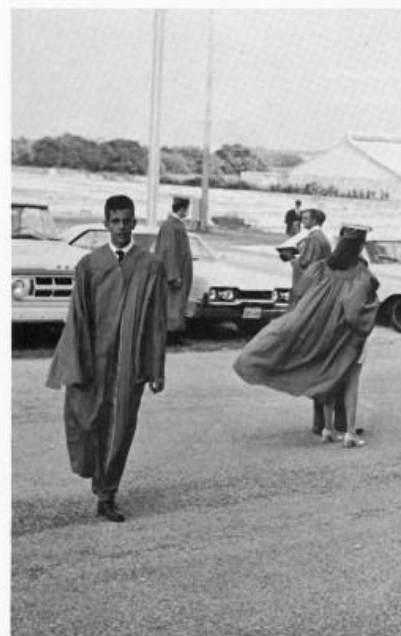

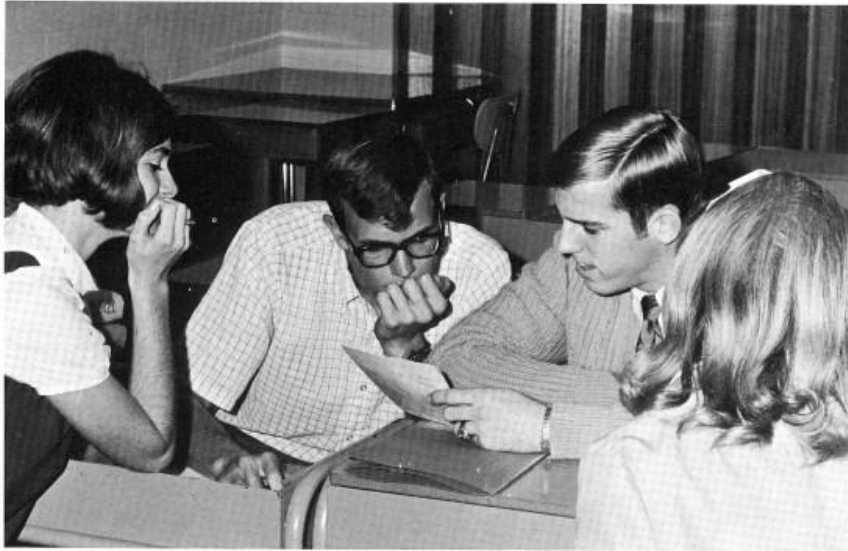

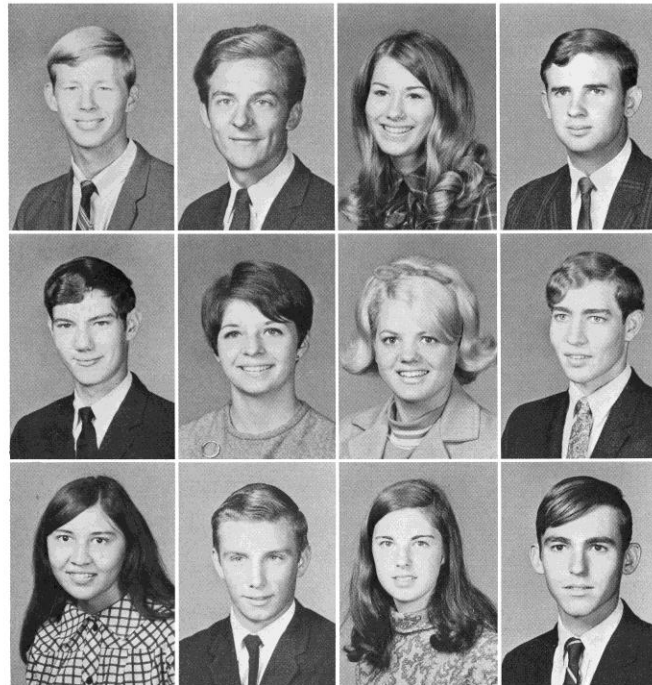

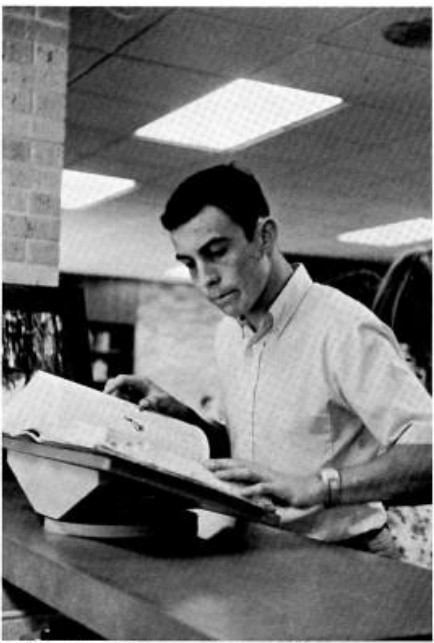
