September's Confusion










Let's Have






It's Beginning To Look A Lot















Mid Term Time


Out Of Hibernation

In Just Spring










And Suddenly It's Over







































A rugged Brahma defense led by McCaffery, David Wylke, Tim Alexander, Jim Briscoe, Gary Sheets, Lloyd Wakefield, Ken Corder, caused five fumbles and intercepted two passes which stymied Austin's offense time after time . . . McCaffery's game winning interception came in the second quarter . . . Don Haines conversion made it 7-0 . . . And the defense took over.




























































